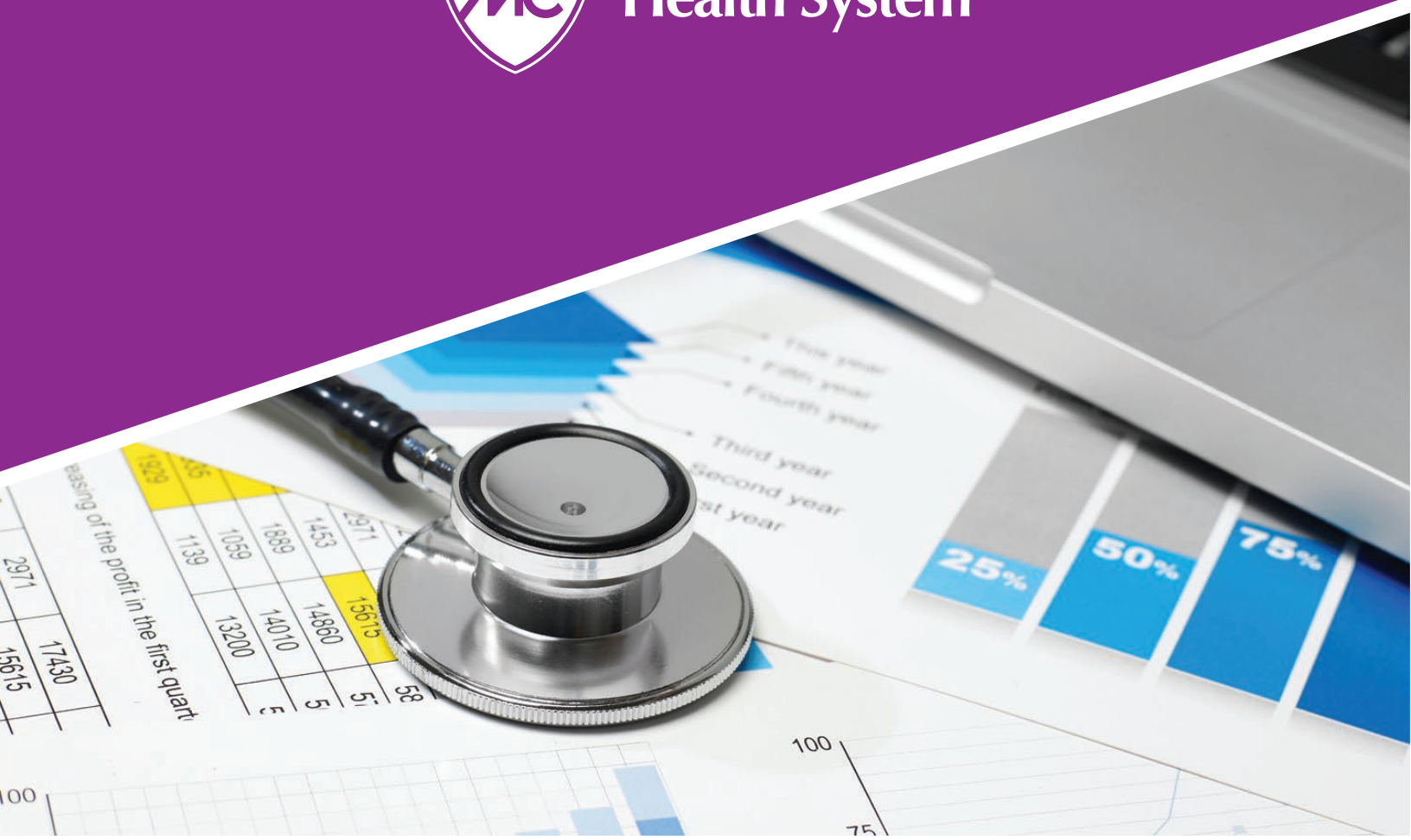

Academic Medical Center

Since 1972, CAMC has been committed to a mission of education, training thousands of physicians, nurses, pharmacists and other advanced practice professionals.

- About 800 learners in CAMC's facilities on any given day
- 188 residents, interns and fellows
- 83 West Virginia University School of Medicine medical students
- 82 West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine students
- 82 students enrolled in the CAMC School of Anesthesia (affiliated with Marshall University)
- In the academic year ending in 2020, CAMC served as a clinical training site for 1,547 learners through 153 educational affiliations with West Virginia and regional colleges and universities
- 29% of graduates establish practice/continue training in West Virginia (10 year average)
- Nearly 21% of CAMC's medical staff received training here (10 year average)
- In 2019, 1,982 continuing education programs were offered with 49,642 hours of CE credit issued

CAMC Health System

The CAMC Health System consists of Charleston Area Medical Center, CAMC Foundation and the CAMC Institute for Academic Medicine.

Charleston Area Medical Center

CAMC has provided outstanding health care to the region for more than 50 years, offering thousands of families convenience and accessibility through its four locations: CAMC General Hospital, CAMC Memorial Hospital, CAMC Teays Valley Hospital and CAMC Women and Children's Hospital. CAMC's broad range of specialties includes a nationally-recognized Heart and Vascular Center, largest Cancer Center in West Virginia, highest level neonatal and pediatric intensive care units, highest level trauma center, Kidney Transplant Center, Regional Neurosciences Center, Primary Stroke Center, Cleft and Craniofacial Center, Weight Loss Center, Pelvic Floor Center, Kidney Stone Center, urology, obstetrics and gynecology, gastroenterology, pulmonology, oral and maxillofacial surgery, general and vascular surgery, infectious diseases, orthopedics, pathology, plastic surgery, ENT, urgent care and primary care.

CAMC Institute for Academic Medicine

The CAMC Institute for Academic Medicine provides continuing medical education, outreach education and research support to physicians, allied medical professionals, as well as patient and consumer health service projects in West Virginia and the region. The institute also operates a school of nurse anesthesia affiliated with Marshall University, as well as 13 graduate medical education residency/fellowship programs sponsored by CAMC and in affiliation with West Virginia University Charleston Division and the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine. Additionally, CAMC sponsors three pharmacy residency programs, a clinical psychology internship and cardiology, oral maxillofacial, pulmonology critical care and vascular surgery fellowships.

CAMC Foundation

The CAMC Foundation is the fundraising organization for the CAMC Health System. The foundation accepts gifts from individuals, businesses, and foundations to support services delivered at CAMC. In 2020, the foundation provided more than \$5.8 million in grants to support patients, families, CAMC employees, and programs that focused on nursing student educational assistance, research and academic medicine. Among those are support of underserved infants and children, new technology, adult and pediatric cancer care and families of patients in need of lodging at the CAMC Foundation Hospitality House.
